

From the Rectory

Dear Friends,

As we get older, opportunities narrow and increasingly there are things that we can no longer do. It's always encouraging to hear the stories of those who buck the trend; and for some of us, the recent spell of glorious mid-May weather conjures up images of the crack of leather on willow.

Sally Barton made her international debut in Gibraltar's second T20 team against Estonia, aged almost 67, making her the oldest debutant in international cricket. Since lockdown, wicketkeeper Sally has been living on 'The Rock' where her husband Ian Tarrant, is the Anglican Dean. Previously they'd been missionaries with CMS (Church Mission Society) and spent ten years in the Democratic Republic of Congo. Sally enjoys Gibraltar because "we can see Africa out of our apartment window... and remember our time there... which was brilliant."

The Gibraltar team won a three-match series against Estonia in what was the first time the British Overseas Territory had played a women's T20 international. Sally told the BBC, "The words 'too old' just aren't in my vocabulary. I never thought I would play international cricket in my sixties, but it goes to show that you shouldn't let anyone tell you it is time to stop playing sport. I might not be as fast as I used to be, but my endurance and everything is still there. My overriding memory of my debut, though, is the efforts of my team mates to get that win." The grandmother of three said she caught the bug from her cricket-mad Yorkshire-born Dad. His "idea of heaven was going to the West Indies, watching the MCC on tour with a glass of rum in his hand."

A recent newspaper headline pronounced, '70 is the new 50... so keep on working.' According to the International Monetary Fund, those aged 70 in 2022 had the same cognitive function as the average 53-year-old in 2000. The research was based on detailed surveys of over one million people aged 50 and over in 41 countries, testing functions such as memory, orientation and basic maths. As well as living longer, most people are ageing in better health, the report added – encouragement for those of us who've passed this milestone.

For the Christian, the challenge is not just to keep going, but to stay focused on our Gospel priorities. In Matthew 24:13 Jesus said, "But he that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved."

As one of our mums said, "It was our first family holiday, and it was lovely to go somewhere together. My daughter enjoyed playing with other children, making new friends. The access was good, the activities excellent, everyone was lovely." On 6th May, Gemma Crowther-Goscheff Coordinator Officer for East Sussex, and Harry Clark as Receptionist and Administration Assistant at Garton House, joined us. We were also sorry in April to say goodbye to Nikki Kerr our Director of Fundraising for the last seven years and we wish Nikki well in the future.

We continue to see the demand for our work grow





and the waiting lists that we hold are getting longer. At this time with many children being supported having educational needs we are only too aware of the anxiety that is created around exams. We are helping some of our families deal with the additional pressures this brings to their lives



Identifying And Reporting Asian Hornets – The Asian hornet (Vespa velutina) is a dangerous invasive species threatening local bee populations across the UK. If you spot one, do not approach or attempt to destroy the nest. Instead, photograph it from a safe distance and report it immediately. Photos and videos can be emailed to: alertnonnative@ceh.ac.uk

Please ensure that you include full location and contact details. Quick reporting of hornets helps stop the spread and also helps protect our native wildlife.

Think you've seen an Asian Hornet? Report it!



VE Day 80: Spotlight On Blackham – This year marked the 80th anniversary of VE Day, and communities across the parish paid tribute to this historic moment. In Blackham, residents commemorated the occasion with a series of quiet, thoughtful displays and gatherings. The village bus shelter featured a moving exhibition showcasing life in Blackham during WWII, complete with memories, photographs, and stories from the time. Each evening, the D-Day Lamp of Peace was lit at Tommy Corner, while the Churchyard was adorned



with flowers and the poignant Tommy Silhouettes were displayed inside the Church. On 10th May at 4pm, villagers gathered at the Church lychgate and walked to Tommy Corner for a moment of reflection – a chance to give thanks for the peace we enjoy today.



Meeting Liz Hunt

Liz was brought up in wartime North London. One day her parents' house in Ossian Road near Finsbury Park was badly damaged after a bomb landed in the road outside and they had to move to a flat in Muswell Hill. Her father was in the Home Guard and Liz was an only child. After the war they moved near to Redhill, and she attended a girls school in Reigate. She remembers the extended period of rationing; just one ounce of butter per week and her father's complaint that a restaurant only had rabbit on the menu. Liz then went to art colleges in Redhill and Wimbledon before going to London University Institute of Education to train as a teacher. Her first job as an art teacher was in a village near Cambridge.

Liz married Tony in 1961 and they soon bought two cottages at auction that later became Lyewood House and it has remained Liz's home for every one of those 63 years since.

The cottages had formed part of Hale Court Farm and were in poor condition. Interestingly, Dirk Bogarde purchased the main farmhouse but he never came to

live there (although he did live on a farm on the Crowborough outskirts), and later sold it.

The renovation of the property was a major undertaking. Each cottage had just one cold tap and only one window at the back. However, Tony was an architect. The winter of 1962-63 was particularly severe with deep, drifting snow and blizzards from Boxing Day until March. For a time, they lived in a caravan in the garden. Lacking a fridge, on one



occasion Liz put a chicken outside in a tin with a brick on it – thus providing a passing fox with unexpected but much needed sustenance. They were eventually forced to live with Liz's in-laws at Hurst Green.

Tony continued work as an architect, first in London and then Edenbridge; sadly, he died some 20 years ago. Liz continued teaching art, first in Edenbridge and then Tunbridge Wells. Some years ago, she taught on two Swan Hellenic cruises and much enjoyed the free holidays!



Liz's other great passion is her garden. She says that she is entirely self-taught from books: "It's a question of trial and error." Initially, she and Tony had no idea that there was a magnificent view from their garden looking east over the valley towards Ashurst, Groombridge and Tunbridge Wells. The garden contains some fine old apples trees, as well as oaks. In the early days at Lyewood, Liz planted a small willow stapling – 60 years on it has grown a bit!

In due course the girls, Clare and Philippa were born and eventually married. Liz now has four granddaughters, two of whom are studying at Oxford University and

two are taking their A levels. Happily, both families live nearby at Tidebrook and Penshurst.

Although the years march on, Liz continues to lead a busy life, still teaching art at Frant, working in her beloved garden (from where she can watch the trains travel between Eridge and Ashurst stations), visiting exhibitions in London and travelling with friends. Liz sums up living in this part of Withyham for so many years: "Living here is like living in paradise!"

A fete has been held on The Buckhurst Estate cricket ground for countless years, courtesy of several Earls De La Warr through the ages. It is recorded in the De La Warr archive that an area of the Estate was historically known as Fair Field because agricultural fairs were held there. At the nearby Dorset Arms public house local farmers would congregate, before and after deals were done. The fete is organised by volunteers to raise funds for St Michael and All Angels Church, and Withyham Village.

Entertainment – There's so much to do... For many years St Michael's Primary School have performed Maypole dances whilst the brass band plays along. There are running races for the children to take part in, and The Owl and Raptor Centre will be showing their birds of prey. The Dog Show is a huge hit with many people and their four-legged friends – there are several classes to enter and something for everyone, even the waggiest tail! There's a coconut shy too, because it's not a proper fete unless someone in your family walks out with a coconut tucked under their arm. This year John Waller will be demonstrating how to make a basket, and this particular basket will be sold at the end of the fete.

Including local crafts, bottle tombola, books, toy tombola, bric-a-brac, children's stall, and the garden stall selling lovely high quality garden ready plants. Meet the Menders at Forest Row Repair Café by Fleur Britten

Tucked away in our drawers, cupboards and got-to-sort-out piles is a nationwide hoard of broken devices – including phones that won't charge, laptops with sticking keyboards and cracked tablet screens. According to businesswaste.co.uk around 20% of all electronic devices in UK homes are unused, slowly slipping into obsolescence because we just don't know what to do with them.

What's more, a new survey by Una Watch found that 47% of us would rather buy a new device than try to fix a broken one. This means that huge amounts are being discarded – UK households produce over 400,000 tonnes of e-waste each year (in fact, e-waste is the world's fastest-growing solid waste stream), with only 31.2% being recycled. As well as the loss of recyclable rare-earth materials, e-waste is also an eco hazard, with toxic elements such as lead, mercury and cadmium, potentially leaching into the soil and water.

Enter the Forest Row Repair Café, or more specifically, our wonderful IT volunteers. Keith Weir, a retired computer specialist, has worked on operating system and distributed systems development, network communications and standards; Nic Gibson is a technical account manager specialising in server and database technologies and other matters too complex for us to grasp. His very capable son, Peter, also often helps out. Together, they've saved countless devices from landfill.

Computers are their speciality, whether it's installing necessary software, fixing bugs, resolving password problems and printer jams, diagnosing why computers keep crashing or run so slowly, or advising on new parts needed, where to buy them, and even helping customers fit them, too. They'll also help with tablets and phones, advising on software fixes or settings problems, though – Keith warned, "these repairs often require micro-soldering, which is best done by specialist repairers – but we may be able to point you in the right direction." Printers he pointed out, have a lower success rate, due to their "complexity."

As with all our Repair Café volunteers, the IT team fosters a can-do spirit: "It's worth trying us on anything," said Keith, "We'll say if it's beyond us." The next café is Saturday 21st June at the Community Centre, Forest Row RH18 5DZ, from 10am-1pm with last orders at 12.30pm.

Computer Corner

Goodbye Windows 10 by Roger Lyon



Windows 10, famously the "last version of Windows", is ten years old and on the brink of retirement. Microsoft's support will stop on 14th October 2025. If you are using a Windows 10 machine at home or for work, this is a good time to plan what happens next.

When Microsoft ends support, it simply means that they will release no more updates. That includes

security updates, performance fixes, and new features. New version of software will continue to work with Windows 10 for quite some time. While no updates sounds rather blissful, it does matter. Unpatched security holes in Windows 10 will remain unpatched and available to attack. This has the potential of bypassing even the great security package that you may have installed on your machine. Many computers can be upgraded to Windows 11. However, Microsoft has been strangely demanding in its hardware requirements.

To check whether your system can be upgraded, you can download Microsoft's free *PC Health Check* tool. It will give you a clear confirmation. If it is yes, you will be offered the upgrade in due course – or you can get a friendly techie to make the transition sooner.

If your PC doesn't meet the requirements, here are your options:

- **Buy a new computer** All new Windows laptops and desktops now come with Windows 11 pre-installed. If your current device is getting sluggish, the money may be better spent on a new machine rather than upgrading
- **Keep using Windows 10** You can continue using it after 2025, particularly for offline tasks, but it may become gradually less secure. This is not ideal for banking, email, or storing personal information
- **Explore alternatives** Technically-savvy users might consider Linux as a secure alternative to Windows

Before you get started, backup your data. There, I said it. Whether you're planning an upgrade or replacing your computer entirely, remember to back up your data first. That means documents, photos, music, and emails. An external hard drive or a trusted cloud service will do the job. This could save a lot of heartache later. If you care about your files and photos then you really should be backing up anyway, just in case...

The Final Word... on Coconuts by Robert Veitch

Enthusiastic readers of this issue, those of you who study every word on every page – Surely there is one of you out there? – will have seen the mention of a coconut shy on page 19.

The first coconut shys appeared at fairs and fetes towards the end of the Victorian era. They were an evolution of Aunt Sally, a game usually played in pub gardens and fairgrounds, in which players throw sticks or battens at a ball, known as a 'dolly' balanced on top of a stick; traditionally, a model of an old woman's head was sometimes used for this.

The etymology of shy is to throw, and to hopefully knock the coconut from the cup, and claim it as a prize.

Participants are usually given three wooden balls, but sometimes more are required for a competitive dad, or particularly persistent child.

Coconuts were exotic prizes for the Victorians, coming from far away places of Empire in India and South East Asia, though found in most subtropical regions today.

It's likely they were no easier to break open back then, as they are now. If you do win one, be sure to let us know!
